Stqeeye' is an Indigenous led non-profit organization based on Salt Spring Island, BC in the traditional territory of the Quw'utsun Peoples. The mission of the Stqeeye' Learning Society is the restoration and preservation of lands and waters withing Xwaaqw'um (Burgoyne Bay Provincial Park). The non-profit was created by family descendants, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, Youth, and other like-minded individuals for the common purpose of restoring the land and cultural sharing. Stqeeye' is com-mitted to preserving the Xwaaqw'um village site in partnership with Quw'utsun mustimuhw (Cowichan people).

Sulatiye' (Maiya Modest)

'Uy' Skweyul siiem nu' siiye / good day my honoured friends and relatives. My traditional name is Sulatiye' and my English name is Maiya Modeste. My parents are Brianna Thorne and Chris Modeste. On my Father's side my grandparents are late Wes Modeste and Diane Modeste (nee Seymour) and on my Mother's side my grandparents are Deb George (nee Nash) and my biological grandfather is Ken Thorne, however I have had the honour of growing up with my grandfather Ron George. I come from the village of Quamichan in Quw'utsun.

Throughout my life I have always had a special place in my heart for nature. I grew up walking the many trails in Cowichan with my grand-parents, learning about our natural "grocery stores" and what they had to offer. My grand-parents planted many seeds of passion in me from a very young age. This passion manifests in many different ways now, such as in the way I show up for the land, for culture, our elders and for the generations to come. I am eternally grateful for the experiences that my family has gifted me especially, considering just two generations ago growing up with culture and access to our natural world was illegal.

I work with the Stgeeye' Learning Society as the Project Coordinator of the P'hwulhp (Garry Oak) Restoration Project which has been my grandmothers dream for me since I was a child. My hope for this garden is to create an accessible space for Indigenous folks to learn about, harvest from and interact with the diversity and the increasing rarity of native food systems. I have the honour of working in and around the village of Xwaaqw'um. During my time here, I have been given the space and encouragement to learn more about myself, my culture, ancestry, and what is truly means to have a relationship with the land. As an indigenous woman I feel that it is my inherent responsibility to take care of the land as my ancestors have since time immemorial and to revitalize our once thriving food systems. It is my hope and dream to one day see youth harvesting from Xwaaqw'um.

Restoration at Xwaaqw'um is a Reciprocal Experience

Ts'its'usum' (growing: child, mind, plants)

Since 2014 Stqeeye' Learning Society has been building relationships with BC Parks, Salt Spring naturalists, organizations, businesses and the larger community to bring Indigenous priorities back to the land. Together with Elders, Knowledge Keepers, ecologists and restoration experts, we developed a comprehensive plan and strategy for restoring the land and estuary (within BC Park boundaries) to pre-contact condition.

In the fall of 2021 we planted over 900 native plants in and around our 3 wetlands and completed a stream repair.

Partnerships

Stqeeye' has many key partner groups, without whom the work would not happen! We strive to work with partners who value the Traditional Ecological Knowledge that our Elders hold, and work to find ways to incorporate Western science alongside the TEK. For example, the BCWF Wetlands Workforce team came to Xwaaqw'um to mentor and guide the team on how to monitor our wetlands and to teach us how to use wetland monitoring equipment. Stqeeye' started off the fall 2021 project by building a relationship with the waters and watershed. We learned that wetland monitoring work includes water chemistry and in-stream techniques.

At the p'hwulhp (garry oak) garden restoration, summer students Molly and Ava helped restore a traditional food garden. Dr. Tara Martin from UBC is supporting this project that is applying experimental techniques for invasive species control in a 50x50m fenced exclosure on a deep soil Garry oak site. This work will help inform future restoration efforts in the Garry oak meadows of Xwaaqw'um.

Stqeeye' has partnered with Kenny and Colleen at Cowichan Native Plants to learn from a lifetime of native plant knowledge and experience. We are very grateful for this opportunity to learn from Quw'utsun Elders.

We invite our partners to participate alongside us in honouring the land. In this way, the two ways of knowing can walk together, building traditional knowledge and scientific literacy at the same time.

Education & Inspiration

Stqeeye' is committed to bringing Indigenous issues and teachings forward in all that we do!

We utilize Hul'q'umi'num' language and culture to provide opportunities for healing the land through ceremony and traditions. Through our Youth on the Land programming, we have reached over 250 students in the 2021-22 school year. We were able to provide food cards to youth experiencing food insecurity in this fiscal year.

Youth on the Land works with Indigenous youth to bring stories, skills and traditional knowledge to life. Harvesting skills, cedar weaving, drumming and story-telling are all taught on the land, as well as knowledge of the seasons and the history of the land.

Our partnerships include SD 64 and 79, Mill Bay Nature School, Indigenous People's Resiliency Fund, Indigenous Community Support Fund, Salt Spring Island Foundation, Victoria Foundation, New Relationship Trust and Lush.

Local SD 64 Teachers and Staff spent two professional development days on the land with Stqeeye' Elders and Staff SD 79 Indigenous Education Department came for a retreat on the land with Stqeeye'. These relationships will continue to expand.

Stqeeye' has participated in Indigenous Advisory meetings at SD 64 for a second year. Since BC has moved to embed indigenous education into highschool graduation requirements, our development of the land-based curriculum is extremely important. Stqeeye' is working to design curriculum with our Curriculum committee and Elder's Advisory. Our work has garnered the attention of Pawanka - an international fund for empowering Indigenous people's to action UNDRIP in local communities.

Stqeeye' is honoured to have skilled curriculum advisors and Elders walking with us to create rich and living curriculum for youth. Stqeeye' is committed to focusing on youth, to close the circle between the future and the past, by bringing critical information from Elders to the next generation, and to ensure intergenerational transfer of knowledge. This education ensures that Indigenous people's have the knowledge to advocate for the Indigenous rights of self determination and free, prior and informed consent.









Prior to contact, the Indigenous People of Xwaaqw'um lived in reciprocal relationship with the land, harvested from the abundant natural food systems, and tending the land and waters with great care.
